COURSE OBJECTIVES

The purpose of this course is to give the students the necessary tools to develop written and oral skills in the several registers of daily life, within the framework of Spanish culture. The student will be made aware of the variety of resources that exist in Spanish, through work in class with formal, familiar, colloquial and technical expressions.

The course is intended to lead the student to a superior level of expression to meet his or her own specific needs, as well as new communicative situations. Accordingly, effort will be focused on increasing student ability through linguistic growth in concrete situations that will be presented throughout the course. All activities will encourage the development of critical thinking on the student's part.

The textbook is designed to meet these ends, and offers many contexts and situations which will support our goals. The text, vocabulary, dialogues for completion, vignettes and all other exercises will be the principal base of our coursework, and will permit the students to increase their vocabulary in concrete situations within specific semantic fields.

STRUCTURE

Following the order proposed in the textbook, exercises will be selected for every class session. Through the readings, we will direct our conversation and discussion themes in class towards situations taking place in different contexts. In addition, there will be other practical and creative linguistic activities independent of the textbook, such as:

- * Inventing dialogues working in pairs using recently learned vocabulary and expressions.
- * Using colloquial language in class conversations.
- * Making critical commentaries on short articles from the newspaper.
- * Role-playing.
- * Oral comprehension exercises.
- * Presenting situations in which each student has to describe his/her reactions.
- * Choosing an item for any Spanish media, and commenting on it. The item will serve as the basis for a debate in class.
- *Guided debates on general themes, sometimes difficult or polemic. The students should be either "for" or "against" and defend their position with convincing arguments.

This is not a grammar course per se, but is rather a course in perfecting language usage in specific contexts, and with special emphasis on the introduction of new manners of expression and idioms. Nevertheless, grammar will be discussed when it is necessary to explain or clarify class material.

This course focuses on oral as well as written communication; therefore, attendance and participation in all activities is mandatory. If the student has an unexcused absence, the participation grade for the day will be "0".

Under the guidelines of the Writing Program, the student must write five compositions of different styles on topics assigned by the instructor. These compositions will permit reflection on material learned and development of critical thinking in Spanish. The compositions must be typewritten on a computer in WORD, double-spaced, Arial 12 font. Be sure to use the spell-checker in order to avoid unnecessary errors. The paragraphs will be marked using a series of symbols, and will be returned to the student for revision; the student then turns in the corrected composition.

During the semester there will be several quizzes on the material covered to date. The final examination will be cumulative, covering all material studied over the semester. An Incomplete will be given only by the Resident Director with the consent of the instructor, only in extreme situations.
